Tēnā koutou katoa.

We are at the end of week 4 and we're nearly half way through Term 1 already.

The past two weeks have offered our tauira(students) many opportunities to experience new learning. Our year 6 tamariki(children) have been out cycling on the local roads with 'Ride On' and Sport Tasman to learn the road rules while understanding the importance of safety when out riding so that they can enjoy having the freedom to ride by themselves around our city. This was really great hands on learning and gave all of the riders increased confidence. Our junior tauira had scooter training that week too. This was really good fun while teaching them a few skills about using their scooters to be able to ride well.

On Wednesday, Angus and Nick from Sport Tasman came to work with our senior students on Leadership. They undertook a lot of team building tasks and physical activity through the thems of Manaakitanga (care, kindness, hospitality), Whanaungatanga (relationships, family and caring for these) and Rangatiratanga (leadership and the qualities of being a leader). We are so grateful to our Sport Tasman colleagues who are so creatve in their delivery of this mahi(work) and make the learning fun and inspiring. We all learn so much by having these kaikao (teachers) alongside us in school.

Our kaiako, Monica(LSA) and our Auckland Point Kindergarten colleagues are enrolled in the Te Ahu Te Reo prgramme for terms 1 and 2 this year. This is a programme that has been developed by experienced kaiako for the education workforce here in Te Tauihu o te waka a Maui. (Top of the South Island). This course is like no other and incorporates te reo Māori (language) tikanga Māori (protocols) and local purakau (stories), to support the language and cultural journeys of those in the education sector. This is exciting learing and we are benefitting by sharing this all together. There are 100 hours of learning to compete and we have already had a noho marae, overnight stay at the Wahaktā Marae and face to learning learning for an hour per fortnight. We are participating in a wananga, a day of learning tomorrow at NMIT. It is going well and we are learning so much. Yo will see us all using te reo more in our every day spoken and written language and we hope to teach you too.

I look foward to catching up with you as you come to Whānau Korero next week. Have a great weekend. It is the official first day of autumn today! However let's hope for many more warm sunny days so we can continue to enjoy our summer activities for a little longer. Ngā mihi nui,
